## Collecting Florida's Fossils by Moiralynn Mefein

According to the Florida Geological Survey office, a division of the Florida Dept. of Environmental Protection, Floridians live in a "veritable fossil hunter's paradise". (See their website at Fossil Collection | Florida Department of Environmental Protection: <https://floridadep.gov/fgs/geologic-collections/content/fossil-collection>).

A brief survey of the State's official fossil collection offers some surprises. It seems obvious that Florida is a prime location for sharks' teeth, sand dollars, and coquina. However, the range of mammals who once lived in Florida includes some interesting, lesser-known critters. Somehow, I had never thought of Florida as a home for the sabre-tooth tiger, the Three-Toed Transitional Horse (see photo), and "shovel-tuskers" (a relative of elephants). A shovel-tusker jaw found in Marion County is from a species (*Amebelodon britti*) known as the largest land animal ever to live in Florida. They were here a mere six million years ago!

Although Florida vertebrate fossils (excluding sharks' teeth) are widely protected, some other items can be readily collected by the amateur. The following excerpt from the web site, Florida Fossil Collecting | Florida Department of Environmental Protection, clarifies the requirements.

*In Florida it is illegal to collect vertebrate fossils (excluding shark teeth) without a permit from lands owned by the state. State lands include the bottoms of navigable waterways like rivers, lakes and some streams. A permit to collect vertebrate fossils on state lands can be obtained through the Florida Museum of Natural History. There is a \$5 fee per year, and the permit holder agrees to report their vertebrate fossil finds on a yearly basis. The state has*

*the right to claim any fossils found that are deemed scientifically significant as a condition of issuing the permit. This law applies to both Florida residents and those traveling to the state.*

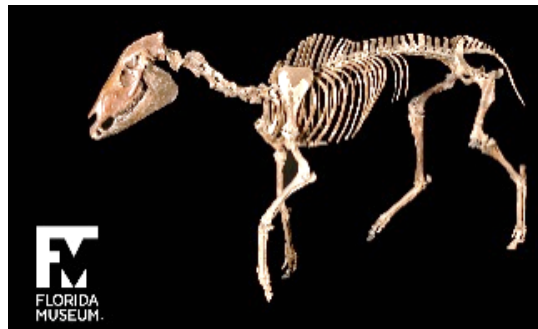
*Like shark teeth, invertebrate and plant fossils can be collected without a permit (sea shells, echinoids and petrified wood). Often times, fossil hunters come across human artifacts. The difference between fossils and artifacts is that an artifact represents something that has been shaped or constructed by prehistoric humans while fossils are the remains of ancient life. Sometimes it is difficult to distinguish between the two as prehistoric people*

*occasionally utilized fossils as ornaments and tools. An example of fossil material that can also be an artifact is agatized coral. Prehistoric Floridians utilized this material to construct projectile points and other tools. If you cannot tell the difference, then it is best to leave the object where it was found. Col-*

*lecting of human artifacts on state lands is illegal.*

*No fossil collecting of any type is allowed inside the boundaries of national and state parks or wildlife refuges. It is suggested that fossil collectors check with the manager of any lands they are interested in collecting from as some areas are off-limits to collecting of any kind. Remember, this applies only to state lands; private lands are a different matter. It is not illegal to remove either human artifacts or vertebrate fossils from private land as long as you have the landowner's permission. However, the collection of artifacts on private land is not allowed if the area contains a human burial.*

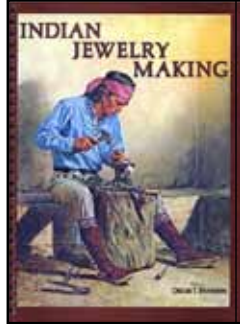




# Jewelry Making Resources by MoiraLynn Mefein

## **Indian Jewelry Making, by Oscar T. Branson (Rio Nuevo)**

Sometimes I remind myself that I can open a well-loved book and immediately find the data I need, rather than search the Internet. One such book is *Indian Jewelry Making*, by Oscar T. Branson, Rio Nuevo Publishers, Tucson, Arizona.



When silversmith Mack Thornton, pressed me to buy this book, I argued that I was not interested in Southwestern jewelry. Mack smiled, and said "Get a copy." He was right, of course.

The book focuses on making conchos, squash blossoms, and turquoise-accented pieces. Yet, the instructions are so well worded, and the pictures so clear, that each technique is easily adapted to other jewelry styles.

There are detailed instructions for all the items you would expect: rings, bracelets, brooches, necklaces, buttons, and beads. Then there are details for making design stamps, chains, and much more.

There also are detailed instructions for making 3-inch tall Native American figures that can be applied to making other character minis. They would make fine brooches or pendants, or just stand on the bookcase looking whimsical. There are instructions for making tiny silver pots and decorating them with Navajo images.

Want to learn cuttlebone casting, or review the techniques? That's here. Thought about making a beautiful box, but unsure where to start? Size, gauge, and cutting instructions are detailed in this book.

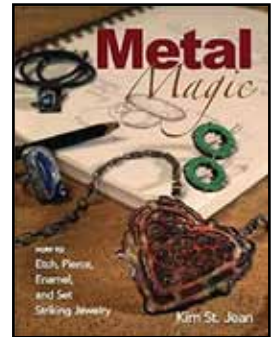
This list represents a fraction of the techniques, designs, and information in the book. Oh – just in case you ever need to know – how to make a horse's bridle is also here.

NOTE: This book was originally published in 2 volumes. Check descriptions carefully if you decide to purchase it, to make sure you are buying the combined book.

## **Metal Magic, by Kim St. Jean (Kalmbach Books)**

Disclaimer: I have taken multiple classes with Kim, so I am naturally prejudiced on behalf of her books. In this case, I think the subtitle says most of what makers need to know about this book. It reads, "How to Etch, Pierce, Enamel, and Set Striking Jewelry."

Kim's style generally involves assembling multiple components into a revealing whole. Her work is more organic than geometrically pure. The results are unusual and interesting, often serving as great conversation starters. I was



returning from her class once, wearing a piece I had made per her concepts. A lady tried to buy it from me while I was eating in a restaurant!

This book has several interesting features, stemming from Kim's minimalist approach to making jewelry without having to take a second mortgage on your home. She provides a list of basic tools that is much shorter than many other instructors suggest. (Of course, she also provides a list that is just short of overwhelming, for those who are setting up a first-time production studio.) Additionally, she suggests individual, task-specific toolboxes, dedicated to specific tasks such as etching or enameling.

The book includes some of Kim's famous, "I never thought of that as a jewelry tool" tips. Protecting your small hammers? Try slipping baby socks over the heads. Avoiding humidity damage? She passes along a tip from her friend, Jade. Saturate butcher's paper in cod liver oil, then wrap it around your tools. Difficulty getting jewelry to stay in position for photos? Use a bit of beeswax to stand it just the way you want.

Tips, instructions, and design suggestions fill every page of *Metal Magic*, making it a valuable addition to your resource library.
